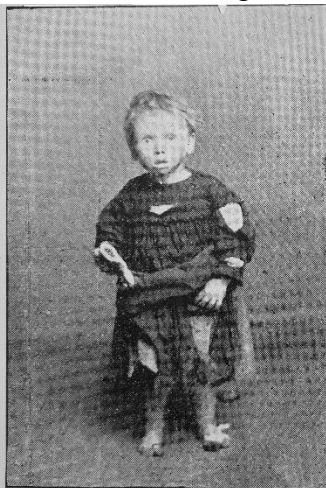

The Lost Children

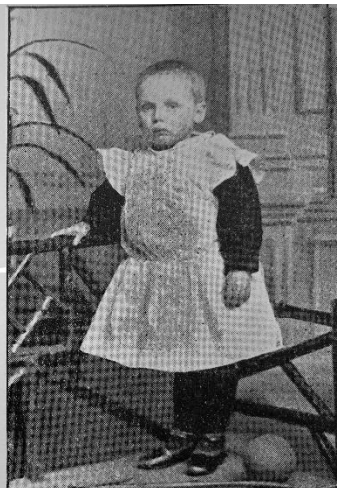

A Wonderful Donation

Some of you may remember Nick Bigg who was a photographer in Balsall Heath in the 1980s. Many of his photos appeared in the Balsall Heath newspaper.

I am sad to report that he died in June, 2018 but his sister, Clare Nicholls, has been in touch as she found an amazing album of Nick's photos of Balsall Heath. She has donated the album to the Local History Society.

The photos are a treasure trove. There is the Opening of the Gurdawara on the Moseley Road, housing construction in St Paul's Road, various school photos, Roshven residents' Christmas raffle, the opening of Pickwick Park, and a wealth of community events of all kinds. Best of all, there is a detailed list of what the photos are about.

Clare said in her letter; "I hope that Balsall Heath Community take great interest in this small piece of social

history". We certainly will do so and are intending to collect more information on the photos by asking people to identify people they remember.

Save Balsall Heath City Farm.

The much loved City Farm in Clifton Road is under threat of closure. It opened in May 1980 when a lot of the area was in turmoil with Urban Renewal. The site on the corner of Malvern St was derelict.

Dick Atkinson managed to raise the funds and get approval for this innovative project, as part of St Paul's Trust commitment to the local community. The Lord Mayor came to declare it open and said, "The farmyard will not only be of value to today's youngsters but also to future generations."



This has certainly proved to be the case for the past 39 years. Thousands of children and families have come in through the gates to meet a variety of animals. Who could forget Buster the goat, one of the first residents, or Charlie the horse?

The farm has survived recession, rebuilding of the neighbourhood, foot and mouth disease and many political changes.. Now the time has come when funding is no longer available to keep it going. Income earned just does not cover the costs. There are plans for sustainability longer term but right now it needs support to prevent closure.
